What's next for Gresham's public safety?

he City is disappointed to share the Gresham Safety Levy (Measure 26-239) did not pass in the May 16 special election. The City proposed this fiveyear operating levy to fund police, fire, homeless services and mental health crisis response.

"While we are disheartened by the outcome of this vote, we greatly appreciate the outpouring of support we have seen from our community over the last few months," said Mayor Travis Stovall.

"Like so many other Gresham votes before, this one truly came down to the wire. The closeness of this vote clearly illustrates just how important every single vote is and how valued our police, fire, and homeless services teams are to this community."

Summer safety

Your safety is our top priority. The City will continue making progress with partners to meet our safety goals. Police safety missions with the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office and Portland Police Bureau are back this summer. Our Safe Gresham effort is adding new safety measures to address community violence (see story, right).

Balancing the budget

Because the levy didn't pass, the City

faced an \$8.6 million budget shortfall in June. The City Council approved budgetbalancing measures before the July 1 deadline, by:

- Keeping the \$15 monthly Police, Fire and Parks Fee.
- Using \$3.2 million in one-time American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) dollars.
- Taking budget cost savings measures.

Money issues remain

This year's last-minute budget scramble is a temporary band-aid. It gets Gresham through the fiscal year. But without new revenue of some sort, the City faces another severalmillion dollar shortfall again next summer.

Work continues toward a more sustainable fi nancial situation for our community. This includes conversations about whether to return the Gresham Safety Levy to voters for a second consideration. Staff will return on July 18 to the Council Work Session with an

Safe Gresham update

The City's community violence prevention effort is improving safety on streets and in neighborhoods by using technology and partnerships with its limited resources.

"Without the resources the Gresham Safety Levy would have provided, we need to rethink our approach to keeping our community safe," said Gresham Police Chief Travis Gullberg. "While we continue to show up for our community, we're also going to be leaning on innovative solutions and collaboration more than ever."

Collaboration

- Assigned four department members to partner with local police agencies on the Joint Retail and Auto Theft Task Forces - in addition to regular duties.
- Used American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding to hire two seasonal park ambassadors to assist Police. Ambassadors serve all parks, providing community presence and guidance.
- Used ARPA funding to hire two community safety specialists to assist Police in work associated with investigations.

Intervention

- Reassigned one detective to the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office Special Investigations Unit. This allows Gresham to increase illegal narcotics distribution investigations.
- Launched a Drones as First Responders pilot program to support patrol staff during shifts.

Prevention

Assigned one officer to full-time public information officer and school liaison position. This work supports Police's response to school and community threats.

Summer safety tips from Police and Fire

t's easy to let your guard down during the slower, lazy days of summer. By keeping in mind some simple tips from Gresham's safety experts, we hope to help you avoid some of the most common crimes and life-safety hazards.



Gun violence prevention

- Be a responsible gun owner.

 Don't leave your firearms in your car where they can be stolen and used to cause harm.
- Prevent tragedy with simple steps: Secure your firearms with keyed locks, combination locks, or firearm safes. Keep your loved ones safe.

Going out of town safely

- Do not announce your trip on social media; post pictures after you return.
- **Use a "mail hold"** or ask a trusted neighbor to collect your mail and package delivery.
- **Set indoor and outdoor lights** on an automatic timer.

Car break-in and theft prevention

• Never leave your unattended car running.

- Don't leave valuables where they can be seen (purses, phones, shopping bags, firearms, etc.) Lock them in the trunk or take them with you.
- Park in a well-lit area.

Above all, the Gresham Police Department is encouraging the community to be prepared and stay alert. If a crime does occur, please report it by calling 503-823-3333 or visiting **GreshamOregon.gov/ Police**.



Wildfire safety

Did you know? Wildfires can also spark inside city limits.

• Only discard cigarettes in an approved container away

- from combustibles.
- Take a walk around your home and clean up clutter and yard debris. Clean out your gutters of leaf and pine needles.
- **During a burn ban,** don't light a fire pit, build a campfire or burn yard debris.

Water safety

- The weather may be hot, but the water is extremely cold even in summer. Cold water shock can incapacitate swimmers within minutes. Wear a life jacket if you plan to go into the water.
- Watch for the dangerous "toos," too tired, too cold, too far from safety, too much sun, too much activity. Take frequent breaks.
- **Safety first!** Don't swim alone, always have a buddy with you to watch out for each other.

Grilling safety tips

- Only use grills outdoors, away from siding and deck railings.
- Dispose of coals after they have cooled in a metal can.
- **Grilling at an apartment?** Check with your apartment manager to learn about rules specific to your building.



Lauren Moran is the City's housing resources coordinator.

This is great news for residents.

"It's complicated sometimes, knowing what resources are out there," said Ashley Miller, Housing Services Manager. "Lauren's role is to help narrow that down for you and steer you in the right direction."

Examples of housing resources the coordinator can assist with:

- Emergency rent and utilities help
- Homeownership down payments
- Fair housing laws, tenant rights
- · Landlord/tenant mediation
- Eviction help
- Rental housing inspections and complaints
- Emergency repairs, accessibility modifications/upgrades

"I love researching what resources organizations have for the community," Moran said.

Please note: Moran does not place people in housing. As housing resources coordinator, she connects people to vital housing services and resources.

Successful City climate action work includes upgrading all streetlights to LED, installing public electric vehicle charging stations, and using electric vehicles.

The Climate Action Plan goes to the City Council for adoption in late 2023.

New Recycle Plus program

Recycle+ is an optional service that lets you recycle extra materials not included in your weekly recycling collection.

"Our recycling program was missing elements our community was looking for," said Shannon Martin, Solid Waste and Sustainability Manager. "Recycle+ fills that void by offering a service to recycle hard to dispose of items."

Recycle+ materials

- Plastic film
- Plastic clamshells
- Compact fluorescent lamp light bulbs
- Cloth materials
- Small cords and electronic equipment (scanners, printers, speakers, etc.)
- Electronics (quarterly rotating item)



The optional Recycle+ program takes clothes, plastic film, clamshell containers, Styrofoam, etc.

Recycle+ fees

Recycle+ is a base fee of \$2.50 per month with an additional \$9.25 per pick-up. Materials are collected every other week in a purple container provided to customers by their garbage and recycling haulers.



Groundwater system expansion: Projects well underway

Y e're pleased to report all nine Cascade Groundwater Alliance projects are underway.

The City and Rockwood Water People's Utility District have been working hard since 2020 to bring our communities an independent, safe and reliable groundwater system by 2026.

"Our partnership with Rockwood Water is a once-in-a-generation investment in a resilient drinking water future," said Mike Whiteley, Water Division Manager. "We are thrilled with our accomplishments the last few years designing and building the water system."


Expanding the groundwater system involves connecting three existing wells, five new wells, a new transmission line, three new water treatment facilities, one new reservoir and a renewed reservoir. See map, right.

New treatment facilities will ensure the water tastes great and will also address future regulations. Most groundwater will be treated at the new Cascade Water Treatment Facility (Project No. 4) just west of Rockwood Water headquarters. This plant will treat 25 to 30-million gallons daily and is expandable.

The expanded groundwater system will provide water to homes and businesses by 2026. Both Gresham and Rockwood Water will maintain a connection to Portland water for emergency and backup supply.
