A win for a safer Gresham

he City of Gresham is grateful to voters in May for passing Measure 26-247, the Fire and Police Levy.

This historic decision brings critical relief to the City's first responders – your firefighters and police officers. It will keep existing public safety personnel and add new positions to the Gresham Fire and Gresham Police departments.

"We are extremely thankful for the support of our community," said Gresham Mayor Travis Stovall. "This levy is a tremendous first step in providing the resources our first responders sorely need and to work toward the safe community Gresham deserves."

This five-year operating levy will fund 13 new firefighters, 9 new sworn police officers, and preserve an average of 30 first responder positions annually.

This will allow us, over the next five years, to:

- Start to build up enough staff to support specialty teams again.
- ► Provide proactive fire prevention services
- Restart regular fire inspections at our schools.
- ► Improve overall emergency response times.
- ► Fully staff an extra fire rescue vehicle at Gresham's busiest station.

Our commitment

We acknowledge that many voters did not support the recent levy and understand the financial commitment it brings. The City of Gresham is committed to showing accountability, integrity and transparency as we build trust and strive to make our community better than ever.

Money management

The levy's funds will go into a protected, dedicated account overseen by a seven-member volunteer committee of Gresham residents. The committee will make regular reports to the City Council and oversee an annual audit.

Next steps

The City of Gresham is finalizing plans for the levy's implementation.

The City Council will provide direction on the oversight committee at one of their August meetings.

Big wins for future water supply

The City and Rockwood Water People's Utility District (RWPUD) formed the Cascade Groundwater Alliance in 2020 to expand Gresham's groundwater system together.

Our partnership is making significant progress toward developing an independent groundwater supply for the people of East Multnomah County by 2026.

\$3 million grant for treatment plant

The City and RWPUD were each approved for \$1.5 million in grant funding through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law Emerging Contaminants (BIL-EC).

The money will be used to help construct the new 28-million-gallon water treatment plant at 19601 NE Halsey St.

The project also includes a 100,000-gallon steel backwash tank, a finished water pump station, and equipment storage.

Saving customers money

This funding, in addition to other sources like our low-interest federal Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act loan, shows how the partners are finding ways to save money for customers as we build the new resilient water system.

New reservoir engineering award

Another recent milestone is completing Cascade Reservoir No. 2. The reservoir is operational and will provide vital water storage for the Cascade Groundwater Alliance.

The reservoir project sets a high standard for innovation, complexity, achievement and value, recently winning the Grand Award in the 2024 Engineering Excellence Awards from the American Council of Engineering Companies of Oregon.

181st Avenue Safety Project

Gresham's most dangerous roads are major streets with high speeds and volumes of traffic.

Among them, 181st Avenue is a higher-injury corridor with more fatal crashes than other Gresham streets.

We're improving safety along a stretch of 181st between Burnside and Stark streets that is closest to the E. 181st Ave. MAX Station. We want this stretch of 181st, near the heart of Rockwood, to feel safer and be safer for people on foot, transit users, and customers visiting businesses.

We have limited funding, and your feedback will help us prioritize the safety elements of our design. This project is federally funded with support from Congressman Earl Blumenauer.

The wheels are turning as we focus on Gresham's

Transportation System Plan, which is out of date and ready for an update.

Pleasant Valley Plan Update

The City is refreshing the Pleasant Valley Plan first established in 2004.

The original vision looked at creating a new 1,532-acre "complete community" with a mix of land uses, transportation options and natural spaces.

To date, only part of that vision has been developed.

In addition to our analysis of the area, we've engaged the community over the past year on updates we can make to achieve the full vision for Pleasant Valley.

This summer, staff is drafting code that aims to remove some

barriers to development and address community feedback we heard. Staff will present the work to date to Council on July 16.

The City Council may adopt updates this fall.

City unveils historic Climate Action Plan

The City Council adopted Gresham's first Climate Action Plan to forge a greener future.

The community-wide plan aims to reduce Gresham's emissions, prevent pollution, improve community health, protect our environment and adapt to climate change.

"The Climate Action Plan will serve as our guide as we all work together to ensure Gresham remains a healthy, vibrant and safe place to call home," said Mayor Travis Stovall.

Staff worked with the community for three years to develop a plan with the community's values.

Next steps

The first strategies we're acting on, are:

- 1. Increasing the community's access to energy efficiency and weatherization resources. This will provide energy cost savings, reduce emissions and improve indoor health and safety.
- 2. Increasing the community's access to emergency response, preparedness information and resources. This will improve the community's ability to shelter-inplace during extreme weather.
- 3. Supporting the maintenance and improvement of tree canopy in neighborhoods that are vulnerable to urban heat.

The City is pursuing grant money to distribute these resources for free to the community and provide educational workshops on these topics.

Climate action journey

Gresham has been on a journey toward climate action for years, beginning with Gresham's signing of the Mayors' Climate Protection Agreement in 2007. Gresham and 1,000 cities pledged to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and prioritize climate action.
