



Let's begin your journey A Step-by-Step Guide to Starting Your Business

Before starting your business, it's critical you're prepared. Ask the tough questions. Determine your reasons and qualifications for going into business. Make sure you're ready. Check out local business resources, courses, workshops, seminars, and networking and use this checklist and resource guide to assist you through the process.



STEP ONE: Ask Questions

Assess your skills & experience. Ask yourself questions like:

- Can you explain how your idea is feasible?
- What type of basic business skills do you have?
- How have you prepared for the time, financial & emotional commitment to start and run a business?
- What support structure or mentor can you rely on to provide guidance and advice?
- What is your comfort level with taking risks and being flexible, creative and persuasive?
- How long are you willing/able to forego a paycheck while the business is getting up and running?

STEP TWO: Research & Planning

Start by determining if your business must solve a problem, fulfill a need or offer something the market wants by:

- identifying market need/competition.
- Researching the industry.
- Researching your target market.
- Building a marketing strategy.
- Then, begin to define:
 - How your business will serve the target market and meet their need.
 - What differentiates your business.
 - The best structure for your business.
 - How you will manage the business.
 - How you will fund the business.
 - Business name and a short 'elevator pitch' that defines the goal of your business and its unique proposition in a quick and relatable way.

STEP THREE: Register Business & Tax Filings

Check the State of Oregon Business Registry database for business name availability and registration. Then, consider what federal, state and local taxes on filing your business may be subject to including:

Resources:

- Business Identification Number (BIN) - If you will be hiring employees, you'll need this for State payroll taxes.
- Employer Identification Number (EIN) - Most businesses will need this for federal income tax purposes.
- Multnomah County Business Tax - Administered by the City of Portland, even if your business is within the city of Gresham.

STEP FOUR: Plan Your Finances

Assess your seed money, one-time costs and variable or fixed costs including:

- Personal finances: Assets & liabilities - cash on hand, savings, investment.

Start-up capital: Initial inventory, equipment, real estate lease/purchase, permits, licenses, marketing, etc.

Operations: Fixed/variable operating expenses, projected sales forecast, cash receipts & disbursements.

Understand: Income statement, balance sheet, cash flow statement.

STEP FIVE: Set Up Record Keeping & Insurance

You may wish to attend technical training and/or hire a professional to help keep your books. Then, choose an accounting system in order to

create and manage your budget, set your rates, conduct business, and file your taxes. Determine and apply for insurance applicable to your business' industry including health, worker's comp, unemployment, and disability insurance.

STEP SIX: Obtain Financing

There are many ways to finance a business including: owner equity, crowdfunding, loans, grants, etc.

Be sure to determine your level of need and associated risk from your financial assessment given each type of financing. The SBA doesn't provide direct loans so work with a service provider to help determine what options are available for your business.

STEP NINE: Sign Your Lease & Obtain Permits

Once you are aware of agency permit and review requirements, sign your lease. Contact any applicable agencies for submittal of permits before moving forward with construction/ remodeling. Consider that you may need to hire contractors and design professionals - be sure to confirm professional licenses. The City of Gresham's Small Business Center can help navigate the City's application and permit-review process.

STEP EIGHT: Find Your Location

If available, it can be beneficial to work with a commercial real estate broker to find available options. It may be helpful to have a lawyer, mentor, or advisor look over contracts to help you consider your obligations. Be sure to determine the types of permits you will need before signing a lease. Gresham's Small Business Center can help with finding a location and determining what permits are necessary pre-lease.

STEP TEN: Pre-Opening & Beyond

If you are hiring employees, be sure to set up tax withholding, verify eligibility, register with Oregon's New Hire Reporting Program, and post required notices. For help with finding and hiring employees, contact the resources listed below.

STEP SEVEN: Determine Licenses & Permits

Research city, county, & state licenses, permits, timelines and other agency requirements. A business license is required to conduct business in the city of Gresham. Other building permits may be required depending on business type and location.
